
PRESIDENT & CEO'S MESSAGE: ANILA LEE YUEN

"Unprecedented" is a word we often deploy casually, but there is no more accurate word to describe what we as a city, nation and global community have experienced in the last few months. Our own Calgary neighbourhoods have been doubly devastated by the dramatic value destruction resulting from the Saudi-Russian oil price war and of course by the shattering effects of the COVID 19 pandemic. It should come as no surprise that our newcomer communities have proven especially vulnerable in these previously unimaginable circumstances. The economic, social and personal impacts of COVID-19 are amplified in those segments of our community that are already attempting to surmount language barriers, a lack of Canadian work experience and precarious housing situations. In this context, the efforts of our extraordinary management team, staff and volunteers at the Centre for Newcomers have been nothing less than herculean: retraining staff, essentially overnight, to be able to seamlessly deliver critical services in an appropriately socially distanced way; and migrating programs online while at the same time working to ensure newcomers were provided access to the technology necessary to participate in such programs. All in all, it has been an extraordinary period in CFN's history and we are deeply appreciative of the relentless passion of our team and its collective dedication to serving the newcomer community. As it has for over 30 years, in the past six months the Centre for Newcomers has played a critical role in shaping an inviting and supportive environment for newcomers, assisting our clients in navigating these arduous times and ultimately striving to support them in the pursuit of their Canadian dreams. That CFN has been able to play such a crucial role during this, the most challenging of times, is a testament to the exceptional support we receive from our funders and community partners. Thank you to all of our stakeholders who give so much of themselves to make our home a better place for all. Increased partnerships and collaborations

At CFN collaboration and partnership plays a central role in how we serve the greater Calgary Community. In fiscal year 2019-20 CFN continued to cultivate its partnerships with 101 formal and 150+ informal partnerships at year end.

Emergency Funding for Homelessness Diversion

CFN's Homeless Diversion Project is dedicated to finding a new way to keep vulnerable newcomers away from homelessness. Using microloans to help newcomers get through difficult periods, coupled with private sponsorship and case management models, newcomers are directed toward self-sustainability and away from the need for shelter facilities.

Canadian Business Essentials for Accountants

Canadian Business Essentials for Accountants, delivered in partnership with SAIT and Charter Professional Accountant (CPA) accepts experienced and internationally educated professional accountants, and provides them with Canadian workplace knowledge, skills. and abilities to assist them in their job search in Canada. We average 120 applicants for just 16 seats per session and over its 14-year existence the program has a 94% employment rate among clients.



Real ME

Real ME experienced an unprecedented year in 2019. Four youth passed away a few days apart in December, from natural causes and through violence. The death of our amazing young people strengthened our resolve to create a safe space for youth, as well as review self-care practices, making it a mandatory part of work for all staff. The Program was nominated for the Calgary Police Commissions Community Policing Award and received a Pathways to Prosperity Award. CFN CEO was appointed to City of Calgary's Public Safety Task Force.

World Refugee Day


On June 20th, 2019 CFN commemorated World Refugee Day, with a community event honouring the strength, courage, and resilience of the millions of refugees around the world. A day-long series of workshops presented by CFN partners and staff was held to challenge negative and inaccurate myths about refugees. Community stake holders took a deeper look into the social hierarchies of our society, and at the roles diversity, inclusion, trauma, mental health, and empowerment play in not only its construction, but in its deconstruction as well.

CFN's 4th Annual Fundraiser Celebrating Diversity

CFN's 4th annual fundraiser "Celebrating Diversity" took place on April 6th, 2019 at historic Fort Calgary to a sold-out crowd. Community members were entertained at what has fast become a signature event in Calgary by a wide array of performances. The event has become a local celebration of our city's kaleidoscope of culture and diversity, and the undeniable potential each and every Calgarian holds.

SETTLEMENT & INTEGRATION





Our settlement and integration programs encompass a wide variety of services for every age range and every walk of life. Beyond our core Newcomer Settlement Programming, our settlement services include more robust LGBTQ+ newcomer supports, under the umbrella of programming we call "Welcoming the Rainbow". This includes helping LGBTQ+ refugee claimants, providing core settlement supports to this population and providing training to partner organizations on SOGIE needs assessments. We remain strong advocates for women's empowerment and have programming like our domestic violence supports, Women's Health Expo and our Empowering Women through Self-Defense training. Our vulnerable population supports include a partnership with Inn From the Cold and Calgary Homeless Foundation where we have staff at the Safe Communities Opportunity and Resource Centre, or SCORCe (pronounced "SORCe"). We also provide clients with Indigenous Education for Newcomers in response to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC) Calls to Action.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE LEARNING

In Language Instruction for Newcomers to Canada (LINC) classes, students develop the necessary language and life skills to participate actively in Canadian society. With **980** clients served, this past year was yet another rich and successful cycle for the CFN LINC Program. With a mix of language, communication and cultural exposure, the program goes far beyond simply learning the English language. Qualified instructors provided practical training to improve skills in reading, writing, listening, and speaking, as well as essential skills, life skills, and a broad sense of cultural awareness about Canada.

Our dedicated staff are available for clients in their first language, as well as in English. Currently, with a team of 14 certified Career Practitioners, we are able to offer not only one-onone support to clients, but a variety of workshops, training programs and career fairs. Although primarily focused on newcomers, through our funding from the province of Alberta, we are able to offer employment support to anyone legally entitled to work in Canada; newcomer or not. With the addition of full-time job placement experts and 32 partners, 74% of our clients are employed after receiving services.




REAL ME YOUTH PROGRAM

Real Me effectively became an independent program on July 1, 2019. After five years of leadership from the University of Calgary, Real Me has come into its own as a program that does more than support at risk youth and their families. Real Me is about impact; changing lives and changing systems. Over the course of the last year, we have become leaders in area of immigration and integration from a youth perspective. We are the coordinators of a community response to at risk -youth, leading over twenty five community partners from justice, health, education and research, to provide a different and more integrated response to newcomer youth and their challenges. Under our new funder. Alberta Justice and Solicitor General, we will continue to provide hi-fidelity wraparound services and maintain our core services: tutoring, counselling, mentoring, employment and life skills; prosocial activities and family support. As we develop as a program and respond to the needs of our families and the communities. Real Me will continue to provide this vital service.



COMMUNITY RELATIONS



CFN's Community Relations team develops relationships with local communities that are predominantly made up of newcomers and their constituents, while also connecting with stakeholders in the broader community to assist in connecting them to newcomers. The continuous expansion of external stakeholders and the development of relationships within the community, including local and national media outlets, in turn serves both our clients and the City of Calgary. Our continuous outreach and development of community partnerships seeks to align the needs of our clients with CFN services and the greater Calgary community as a whole.
